

Old Victorian Garages




Bayford Ford

In continuation of some coverage of early Victorian Ford garages, agents and dealers, this month we feature Bayford Ford. How many club members have purchased a Ford over the years from a Bayford Ford dealer?

Bayford's was the longest surviving family-owned car dealership in Australia. Bayford family members still have an interest in the company but it was largely acquired by the Autopact group in 2017.

It started life as a Ford dealership in 1917, operating from a small shopfront in Victoria Parade in Fitzroy. The site is now part of St Vincent's hospital.

The founder, Mr Dick Bayford, had worked as an engineer with the main Victorian Ford agent and assembler, 'Tarrants', then, for the Ford Motor Company in the USA, and returned to Melbourne using his USA contacts to establish his own Ford agency. For those Essendon supporters in the Club, Dick Bayford also played for Essendon in the VFL!

Veteran Car Club Mid Winter Rally - St Arnaud Vic. By Robbie Dalton

We have received the following report of some of our members attending an event in their Veteran Ts. Thanks to Robbie for this contribution. —Ed.

Once again Christine and I attended the Veteran Car Club's Mid-winter Rally, this year at the historic town of St. Arnaud, in our T.J. Richards bodied 1915 Roadster. Some readers may recall that on this rally last year, our car broke a driveshaft, and I am happy to report that this year we came through unscathed and had a great time.

The rally kicked off with a registration, 'meet and greet' at the local sporting club. Rally bags were given out and at 2.00 pm we set off for a short shakedown run of about 10 km.

We drove to GILMAC and parked our cars in their carpark. We were then entertained with a presentation about the company and learnt that they are an exporter of Australian fodder to East Asia. They receive truckloads of large bales and process it into smaller packs and then load it into containers for export. Each pack is made up of 30 smaller bales that can be handled easily by workers.

On return to St. Arnaud we parked our cars in the main street for the benefit of the locals and wandered around looking at the shops. Our evening was an enjoyable get together at the sporting club with a lovely meal and talk by the rally director.

Saturday was a run of about 125 km total. We drove from St. Arnaud to Rupanyup. The trip was uneventful but we were encased with a very thick fog all the way, so we saw very little of the countryside. On arrival we visited Wood's Farming and Heritage museum. A huge collection of everything one could imagine and morning tea and lunch was supplied by the staff of the museum.

Our trip home was better as the fog had lifted and we could admire the sights as we travelled sedately home. Saturday night's dinner was at the only other place in town that could fit us all in, the sports club had already been pre booked, 2nd best was a bit squeezy but the meal was excellent, with some musical entertainment and good company.

Sunday was a car display and a short drive around town, with a morning tea stop on top of the hill in town. Here we learnt about the eucalyptus il industry in the area and also that the town was founded on gold. We then went to the home of the rally director to look at his collection of veteran, vintage and classic cars. Lunch was supplied by the local Lions club and we left at about 1.00 pm. Penrite Factory and Museum, July 27 - David Jenkins & Thelma Huitt

Today saw a great turnout of both Model T and A vehicles visit Penrite, Lane 88, vehicle collection.

The collection of vehicles of two and four versions is a credit to the Diamond family and a big thank you to them for allowing us to view their collection.











Company History...

From small beginnings in 1926, Les Mecoles, at 16 years old, founded Penrite Oil Company from his parents' home in St. Kilda, Melbourne, Australia.

The first batches of oil were made on his mother's kitchen stove and delivered to service stations,

milling factories and the local shipping port using his father's wheelbarrow. Oils were manufactured from the highest quality lubricants from Pennsylvania (PEN) base stocks, regarded at the time as the best in the world. Only the right oils (RITE) were ever sold to local customers, hence PENRITE, with its

unique name, gained trust and respect amongst many.

As the business grew, a new blending facility was built in Richmond. After several years, Penrite again moved to Abbotsford. At this time, Melbourne and regional Victoria grew in population and the road and railway network expanded across Australia, which created opportunities for business expansion. Penrite introduced new automotive products including batteries and oil filters.

The business continued to grow, however in 1979 Les Mecoles, suffering from poor health, sold the company to John and Margaret Dymond. John (JD) served a 7-year apprenticeship at Vauxhall Motors, Luton, starting work at 16 years old. He obtained a mechanical engineering degree at night school. Whilst at Vauxhall he became a draughtsman, specialising in the design of gearboxes. He and Margaret moved to Melbourne in March 1958, where he took up a position with BP Australia in the Technical department.

During this time, JD assisted in the development of lubricants for the harsh climates of Malaysia, Papua New Guinea, and Northern Australia. In 1968, JD took a job opportunity at Lubrizol Australia, an American international additive producer, so he could become involved in the additive industry which was becoming an important part of lubricant production

John's 20 years' experience in both the oil industry and the additive market gave him the background and knowledge he needed to take up the challenge of his own company, PENRITE OIL. Penrite continues to be 100% Australian owned and managed from Dandenong South, Melbourne by the Dymond family. Margaret continues serving on the board of directors. All of the Dymond siblings play a role in shaping the business, and some of the grandkids are the first of the next generation coming into the business.

During the course of the last few years, I have been able to witness first hand some of the projects that have passed through Frank's workshop. One of the more recent projects which is still in progress is the engine from Russell Medhurst's Coupe. The broken crankshaft was mentioned in recent 'Newsy Bits', but it wasn't until the tear down, the full extent of the damage was realised! Here is a

Birtles & the Bean Epic Drive Recreated!

Many members may recall the recreating of the 1906 Peking to Paris in 2006 by journalists and adventurers, Warren Brown and Lang Kidby. The series was a hit presentation on the ABC. The two participants are at it again, this time in 2025 re creating the 100th anniversary of the famous Aussie motoring adventurer, Francis Birtles' drive from London to Melbourne.



Brown & Kidby launched separate expeditions in this anniversary year, both sourcing and preparing similar 1925 Bean cars and embarking on their own versions of recreating the original journey. Francis Birtles is well known to many of us from his early Aussie motoring adventures in his Model Ts. irtles later used English "Bean" cars for his epic trips. Another Model T Era Aeroplane

Members may recall an earlier article about the Model T powered aeroplane, the 'Pietenpol'. The Pietenpol was privately made and its only connection to Ford was the possible use of a cut down Model T powerplant. However, Ford did make an early effort to enter the skies with a Ford built aircraft. Here is the story.

The Ford Flivver was a single seat light aircraft that was built in 1926 at the behest of Henry Ford. His only stipulation was that it be small enough to fit into his office. The just completed first prototype was unveiled on July 30, 1926. It was flown regularly by Ford's chief test pilot, Harry J. Brooks. The tiny aircraft was designed to be "every-man's aircraft" just as Henry's Model T was "every-man's automobile".

The Ford Flivver inspired a New York Evening Sun columnist to write a poem about it:

I dreamed I was an angel And with the angels soared But I was simply touring The heavens in a Ford.

Charles Lindbergh was invited to fly one of the prototypes at one point. After his flight he proclaimed the Flivver to





be, (quote) "one of the worst aircraft he ever flew" (unquote).

Brooks had a Flivver prototype modified so he could try for long distance record for light aircraft. The flight was to be from Dearborn Michigan to Miami, Florida. He made a forced landing in Titusville, Florida where he repaired a bent prop and then spent the night after which he again set off to continue his flight. While at Titusville he had jammed toothpicks in the vent holes of his fuel cap to prevent condensation from entering the tank overnight. When he left the next morning on his flight he had forgotten to remove them. His Flivver crashed in the ocean off Melbourne. Florida due to fuel starvation due to the blocked air vents. Brooks' body was never found although the aircraft later washed up on shore.

Henry Ford was so devastated by the death of a favoured employee that he pulled the plug on development of the Ford Flivver.

- Over 6,000 respondents across 800 motoring clubs in a nationwide Economic Value Study confirm close to \$10 billion in annual expenditure on historic vehicles
- An estimated 970,000 historic vehicles in Australia with owners spending close to \$10,240 per vehicle per year
- Australian Motor Heritage Foundation: "In carrying out this study, we have shown that the historic vehicle movement is a large and vibrant part of Australia's society and economy."

Sydney, 11th April, 2024 – The owners of Australia's historic vehicles spend some \$9.9 billion each year on their passion, according to a new survey.

The Economic Value Study (EVS) of well over 6000 Australian respondents, distributed to over 800 motoring clubs nationally, was conducted for the Australian Motor Heritage Foundation (AMHF) by The Mercurius Group (TMG). The Foundation is champions of Australia's motor heritage, and an organisation dedicated to promoting and preserving Australia's motoring history.

The enthusiast owners of an estimated 970,000 historic vehicles in Australia spend on average \$10,240 per vehicle annually, around 12.5% more than people who own daily driven cars. The historic vehicle fleet represents 4.4% of Australia's 21 million total vehicle fleet. Around 50% of the survey respondents own only one historic vehicle, the other 50% owning two or more vehicles. "Historic" vehicles are in two categories: those 15 to 30 years old defined as "classic" vehicles and those over 30 years old defined as "heritage" vehicles.

Such a survey has never been comprehensively undertaken on so wide a scope or on a national basis in Australia. Following publication of the similar landmark 2020 HERO-ERA study in the UK, the AMHF decided to find out what is the real figure for the economic contribution of historic vehicles for Australia.

"The findings of this report have certainly highlighted the significance of the historic vehicle sector to both the community at large and the economic sector," says Hugh King, Chairman of the AMHF.

"The response from Australia's motoring club members has been unprecedented: the economic modellers at TMG have never had so large a data pool to work with, proving motoring enthusiasts care as passionately about their historic vehicles as they do having their voices heard. In carrying out this study, we have shown that the historic vehicle movement is a large and vibrant part of Australia's society and economy."

The survey also reveals the total annual economic impact, including both direct and indirect expenditure, is \$25.2 billion: with the sector creating almost 79,000 jobs – 42,000 direct and 37,000 indirect. These jobs generate \$6.2 billion in wages and salaries annually. These are very large numbers by any standard.

Stavros Yallouridis, CEO of the Motor Traders' Association of NSW (MTA NSW), said the AMHF's survey gave yet more irrefutable evidence of the significant contribution of the automotive sector in the broader Australian economy.

"Despite the end of local vehicle manufacturing, Australia maintains a rich and diverse automotive industry, which employs hundreds of thousands of people across a range of roles," Mr Yallouridis said.

"The automotive sector is one of the backbones of our economy and is also at the heart of our communities. This survey, and the enthusiastic response, highlights the necessity for Australia to back its automotive sector with world-class training, local skills development and career pathways."


