I would like to ask our members if they could suggest some ideas for any activities or presentations from any companies or anybody to our General Meetings. Can be very entertaining.





Restoration Story



The Morrrison 'Hillview Ford' Restoration Story

In October 1925 George Morrison, my great grandfather decided to order a Model T Tourer from *Prictors Garage* in Daylesford. The price was 169 pounds 10.

On 26 Jan 1926 a brand new T was delivered to the family farm, 'Hillview' in the locality of Yandoit, Victoria. It was 'buff' in colour, this being the famous Dalgety Ford. It served the family for many years until in the 1940s tyres became impossible to get, so the T was destined to become a farm implement.

The rear tub was removed, chassis shortened, and the exposed tail shaft used to mount a belt pulley to drive a saw bench, which supplied firewood for the family for many years.

In later years my brother and I played on the remains that had been left in an old shed which eventually fell on top of the poor old T.

In the 1970s Dad's brother gave him the car to restore, so we found all the parts we could from the surrounding area under the fallen shed and shifted it all to our farm about 8kms away.

Some parts were stolen over the years, radiator and shell and coil box, but at least we got most of what was left. The rear tub was never recovered. Dad collected many parts from clearing sales and added to the inventory of rusty stuff. As time and life passed by it became impossible for Dad to attempt such a massive restoration so he gave the whole collection of car and parts to me.

In August 2000 the whole project was shifted to our property in Ballarat and a complete ground up restoration began.

The next 10 years saw a lot of cleaning repairing and rebuilding. The original body was beyond practical repair so a local body builder who spiralised in custom cars was engaged to make a completely new body, using steel instead of wood for body support, but paying close attention to the Dalgety body line and panel creases to keep that special Dalgety look.

This took some time, which allowed me to rebuild all the mechanical parts including the engine, transmission and running gear. Owning an engine reconditioning business during this time was a great help.

After all the sub-assemblies were complete and I sold the business in 2010, the final assembly took place.

Special mentions to all who helped in this massive project. I could not have done this without the help and support of friends. Geof Baulch and I spent untold hours in my shed, thanks Geof. Allan Bennett was always available for that hard-to-find part or information and general encouragement through the rough bits. Thanks also to family and friends and Shirley for support with this project.

While all this was happening, Dad was admitted to a care facility in Castlemaine, so the first trip was to show him and revive some memories for him and his brother.

Our first club outing was the Hamilton Rally in 2011, where we enjoyed a great time of driving our new Dalgety T. The need for a top was the last step in the journey, so after Geof and I made the bows and assembled the roof structure we trailed the car to Peter, Bray Motor Trimmer, Light Pass in South Australia. Peter did a remarkable job. His attention to detail, the material and workmanship is a credit to him. Wherever we go people comment on the top, great job Peter.

In 2015 we had the pleasure of using

our T in our youngest son James' wedding in Coffs Harbour, quite an adventure in a friend's Hino truck. We have now downsized and retired and plan to use the T for more runs and daily drives. ——



Restoration Update



1926 Speedster Build - Part 1

The saga of my speedster started back in December 2018. I had finished my TT Truck and was looking for another project and a speedster was in the back of my mind. The thinking was that I could justify another car if it was made from parts salvaged from Swap Meets etc. I had a chassis and front axle and I let Brian Smith know that I was looking for a set of wire wheels. Within a couple of days Brian came back to me with details about a set of wire wheels. He said they looked to be in great condition, there were five of them, but there was just one or two things that may be an issue.



The first was that the wheels were attached to a car, and second was that the car was buried in a shed somewhere in Castle Hill, Sydney. It just so happened that I had been working in Sydney for the past 18 months, flying up Monday morning and back home on Friday afternoon. I went for a look one evening after work, and went back to work next day the proud owner of five wire wheels and all this stuff they were attached to.

The next weekend is a bit of a blur. I flew home on Friday and hooked up the trailer, drove to Sydney next day and loaded the car and all the parts that came with it. We drove home on Sunday, unloaded the car and all the spare parts and I was back to Sydney next morning on the 6.00am flight.

The first job over the holiday break was to strip it all down and see what all the bits attached to my wheels were like. The odd thing was that the wheels had been freshly painted and a new set of tyres fitted before it got pushed into the back of the shed and forgotten about. The body didn't take much to remove, it would have been nice to be able to say the same about all the crud which plastered the chassis, axles and engine. The car must have had a colourful life after it was converted from a Tourer into a Ute. Whatever it was that was plastered all over rest of the car actually formed a protective layer over the whole thin, and once I went through all the pain of removing it, found that the steel was remarkably well preserved! This was 6/01/2019 when the cleaning



and rehydration with beer was getting under way.

The intention was that it was going to be a Speedster, so it needed to be lowered. I was forbidden by Brian Smith to modify the chassis in any way. It seems we are governed by much stricter rules over here than in the US.

1926 Speedster Build




It took several different attempts on both the front and rear ends to achieve the fabricated bolt on brackets which are in place today. The first two types of brackets I made for both the front and rear ends seemed to tick all the boxes but after looking at them for a day or two the voices in my head started to tell me that they could be improved on, so it was in the bin each time and start again with the next version. The car is 125 mm lower and the wheel base is also extended 125 mm. The front spring now sits behind the front axle and I am pleased to be able to say we still have full steering from left to right.

The back axle was rotated upside down and the differential rebuilt and assembled to ensure forward motion in forward gears and backward motion when reverse pedal is depressed. The spring perches were rotated and bolted up to the fabricated bracket which bolts on to the wheel hub. The axle is now located at the rear of the spring. The differential is now located further away from the engine so a longer drive shaft had to be made up to suit, and the torque tube extended to accommodate this extra length. I am fortunate in that my closest neighbour, Fred Motschell, is not only a great

mate but an old time tool maker, fitter and turner. Anything that has to be turned up is an excuse to wander over and see how a master craftsman/tradesman operates.

I wanted to take advantage of the bigger brake drums on the 26-27 rear end and installed a brake equaliser kit available from the US. It was not without some teething problems and not as straightforward as the glossy instructions would like the customer to think. There are other better alternatives available but the cost of the equaliser kit was a big influence. The first problem I found was that when the brake pedal was pushed, the pressure exerted on the handbrake lever shaft caused the shaft to distort about 4mm before the brake rods started to operate the brake shoes. I made up an adjustable gusset to reinforce the shaft and stop the distortion. I queried this problem with the supplier in the US, and as requested, sent some pictures to illustrate the issue. That was about two years ago. To date I have had no reply and am fairly sure that there will not be one anytime soon. The next problem was adjusting the brake rods to pull in the rear brake shoes a little before the transmission brake. I think it is finally in a good place, but needs some real world driving to prove it is working correctly. I can lock up the rear wheels but it is something that will need to be checked once the car is on the road.
