





### SILVER LAKE FLOUR MILL

The Silver Lake Flour Mill at Sale has been operating for the past 21 years with increasing success. A new suction gas plant of 74 horse power is at present being installed. In addition to local grain, the product of the Northern district is also operated on. Besides executing orders from various parts of the Commonwealth, 250 tons of flour on an average are consigned monthly overseas.

The [Silver Lake Flour Mill](#) in Sale, Victoria, is no longer in operation; it was deregistered as a company in 1964 and is now a historical site. While it was a successful mill for many years, a notice of winding up was issued in 1964, and it has since been a topic of discussion among local historical societies due to its previous prominence.

### Alan Flude — 'My Life With Cars & Model T Fords' Part 2(continued from Nov T Torque)

In 1989 I attended my first national Model T rally, *T Time 89*, without a Model T. My parents came as well. My father Doug, a retired builder, intended to help me build the body for a veteran T. We had experience in repairing the wooden framed DKW body together. On that event I met Neil Feldtmann, who became a close friend and was instrumental in guiding me towards building an authentic 1913 Tourer. Neil, his father Bruce and I shared a long friendship. We went to the 1992 national rally without a T, then our family co-entered with Neil's 1911 T Tourer in both the 1995 and 1998 national T rallies.

We were building an early 1913 Canadian-bodied Tourer (December 1912 build) in the late 1990s. However, I wanted a T on the road for our family to enjoy together. In 2000 I purchased a 1927 Tudor Sedan. With the Feldtmann's help we completely rebuilt all the mechanicals and I made repairs to the body. Our first outing was the 2001 national T rally in Goulburn. Since then, that car has been our steady rally vehicle, attending every national rally with family, in later years with Jill and myself. That same year I purchased a totally original 'Geelong T', a 1927 T Ford Deluxe Roadster that will require some work. Other cars have been added since, to further clutter my garage workspace.

Interesting how paths cross in this hobby. I came second in class competing at Morwell Hill Climb in the mid 1970s in my modified VW Beetle, beaten by a dark blue 1972 Ford Escort GT 1600 (Lotus Twin Cam Engine). That car was owned and driven by Robbie Dalton, who held the class record for years. Robbie still owns this Escort GT 1600. When racing go-carts in the late 1970s I saw a demonstration lap at the Brooklyn track, a previous National record holder.

### Alan Flude — 'My Life With Cars & Model T Fords' (Part 2) continued...

A unique 6 wheel equipped go-cart with 4 front wheels, this go-cart was owned, built and successfully raced by Bill Wallace. Both Robbie and Bill are active members of the Club.

My working life was closely tied to the automotive industry, in both auto manufacturing and aftermarket suppliers. For forty-five years the two Australian companies I worked for had contracts with all Australian auto manufacturers, Ford Australia especially going back to the 1960s. That expanded to Ford globally, and more recently most USA, Japanese and Korean auto manufacturers. My job role regularly took me interstate and overseas, our company establishing offices in Michigan USA and Cambridge UK. My numerous trips to the USA enabled visits to fellow enthusiasts and museums. In the USA I frequently visited the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village. Also visited the Ford and Edison winter estates at Fort Myers, Florida, and other Ford and Edison legacy sites. I retired from work in 2019, soon after Ford, Holden and Toyota ceased manufacturing in Australia. Closures in the automotive component sector quickly


followed. The personal impact on me was almost like a death in the family, with the end of the Australian automotive manufacturing industry as we knew it. The loss of knowledge, skill, prosperity and Australia's future security will be immeasurable. My daily driver is a 2016 Ford Territory built just days before the end of Ford Australia production, the end of an era going back to 1925.

In retirement time spent with family is precious, especially grandchildren. At this stage in life my beloved sports boat was sold, replaced by a caravan with more mundane holiday activities. Jill and I are moving into another home with a significant newly-built garage and workshop complex. We intend to renovate this house after moving. Supposably, I now have time to restore the cars and projects I've collected over the years. A priority is to finish my 1913 T Tourer and get my 1927 T Roadster drivable. There are numerous other cars to keep me busy, I do enjoy working on projects and maintaining the vehicles that have shaped so much of my life.

For anyone wanting to own a Model T, I feel it helps to have an interest in automotive history and the willingness to maintain the car to a certain level. The reward is not just the enjoyment in driving a unique piece of motoring history, but being part of a community of people who share the same passion. Attending the national Model T rallies has been a real highlight. Within the Club I've served as Secretary and Treasurer across multiple years. These roles gave me the opportunity to give something back to the Club that has provided Jill and me with so much pleasure.



## Restoration Story



### 1926 Roadster

*It is a pleasure this month to present the restoration story of a very special 1926 Model T Roadster. The following text is provided by a former club member, Ian Mallows, who provided a diary and photos detailing his involvement in assisting with the restoration of Jacinta Bagot's Roadster in time to participate in the National Rally at Ballarat.*

*Ian is most certainly not new to Ts, and through the earlier Years of the MTFCV developed a strong friendship with Neil Bagot and assisted him with restoration of several of the Bagot fleet of Ts. Ian served on the rally committee for the club's first National T rally at Wangaratta, served as the club secretary and also shared the position of Editor with his wife Carol. Ian's hobby interests diverged from Model Ts to restoration of classic motorcycles and later model Classic sportscars, but he has always maintained a strong interest in Model Ts, the club activities and the Bagot family T club participation. We thank Ian for documenting the project and sharing the following text and pictures of this project. Ian's mechanical, panel, paint and upholstery skills were all utilised during the project!*

The Project commenced January 2023, preparing chassis to accept motor which was already repaired but hadn't started. The spring sets, differential and rear axle were assembled



after careful selection of bits from the collection at the end of the shed.

Next came the selection of all the necessary 1926 panels from the various collections of left over parts, making sure the bits were repairable where necessary, and trial fitting them together till we were satisfied we had enough of the correct bits. The first setback was after we selected and repaired the best 2 doors only to find the hinges were wrong and would not come off so the second best doors with the correct hinges were selected. Then came the cutting out of all the rust or badly damaged metal and welding in new pieces. Lots of panel beating and grinding/sanding till they looked ok.

100 year old timber acquired by Christopher, sawn down by David Dryden and dressed to size by Declan before preparation of the timber frame upon which the body panels were to be attached. We purchased a morticing tool online that allowed us to assemble the wooden frame as it was done in 1926, then the body panels were attached and tacked or screwed into place before more heating and panel beating to get them true so doors would open and close correctly.





## Restoration Story continued...



### 1926 Roadster

The first coats of primer filler paint became a slight disaster over the following month as small pieces started peeling off and the decision was made to sand blast it all off and start again with a different brand of paint, and this time I applied a coat of etch prime before the primer-filler.

After that setback, in early 2024 we began the tedious task of doing all the surface prep again and finally in May 2024 I could finally apply the first coat of final colours- Seagull grey. (same as FB Ute) and black. About this time we had the wire wheels sand blasted and painted 2-pak black. The next 12 months seemed to go very quickly and 2025 was upon us.

Weather is not conducive to spray painting so I have moved to the task of making suitable hood irons from earlier tourer irons. Hood bows made using 3mm



plywood cut into strips and glued together in a makeshift jig. Upholstery came next during the winter months.

The safety inspection for club plates was done in September then a longer drive Up the hills in East-West Rd was done mid September and decision made that it was ready for the big National Eureka T rally in Ballarat at the end of September 2025.

Jacinta quickly adapted to driving her Roadster and completed the National Eureka Rally successfully.

## Article of Interest



### 'The need for Speed' - Some Model T Speedster related content

*A few months ago we featured an article from Mark Herdman including some information on his Ted King Rajo powered Model T Racer. Mark has been busy preparing the vehicle's restored chassis and running gear, less body for possible display at the upcoming 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Sydney's famous Maroubra Speedway. #### Maroubra Speedway Centenary

Officially Olympia Motor Speedway, opened on Saturday 5 December 1925. A wide range of cars and motorcycles competed, with many celebrated cars being imported to race there including Bugatti, Grand prix Sunbeam, Delage, Indianapolis Ballot, Brooklands Alvis and even Model T Ford specials. Speeds around the banking were astounding for the time approaching 100mph, 2 - 3 times the speed the thousands of spectators would ever have experienced. Unfortunately the Speedway had a short life and after financial difficulties and a number of fatalities was closed. It became the site of Coral Sea Park and housing development after WW2.

The Vintage Sports Car Club of Australia is celebrating the centenary in the south west corner of Coral Sea Park on Sat 6 December from 10am to 2pm, with a number of cars which competed there attending. ### 'The Need for Speed'



Hope to see you there. All welcome.




